Do you speak Ely? If 'jearse', he wants to hear from you...

A JAPAN-based teacher has put out an appeal to the people of the Isle of Ely, to find out if their traditional vocabulary is dying out.

Stephen Howe teaches English in Japan, but was born in the Isle of Ely.

Next month he will give a lecture in Cambridge on the East Anglian dialect his ancestors spoke, and has appealed to local residents to help with his research.

He said: "I am interested in the East Anglian dialect that my grandparents spoke, my father speaks and that I can speak.

"This March, I will give a talk at Cambridge University on the words 'jearse' and 'dow' – emphatic words for 'yes' and 'no' – used in the Isle of Ely and possibly other parts of East Anglia. These words are not included in the Oxford English Dictionary; however, we still use 'jearse' and 'dow' in the Isle of Ely today."

He is looking to find out how widespread the terms are today, and whether people still living in the region would recognise them.

He said: "I wonder whether it

might be possible to ask your readers whether they know and use these words?

"I would be very interested to see how widespread they still are and how they are used."
